peacocks are male, but aren't they always rather like haughty pantomime duchesses?

FOCUS ON DOMESTIC ABUSE AWARENESS

Domestic abuse can happen to anyone, of any age. We are seeing a particular rise in cases of abuse being reported by people over 71 years and with one in four women and one in six men experiencing some form of abuse in their lifetime the chances are we all know somebody who is experiencing domestic abuse behind closed doors.

It happens in all types of relationships, regardless of race, ethnic or religious group, class, disability, sexuality, lifestyle or nationality.

Tensions can escalate due to restrictions on socialising and 'normal life', but they are never an excuse for violence, manipulation, coercion and controlling a partner or family member. Even if you are self-isolating, government guidance allows you to leave your home to flee an abuser or seek help. It's rarely a one-off occurrence, but usually a pattern of abusive and controlling behaviour.

The Government define domestic abuse as:

"Any incident or pattern of incidents of controlling, coercive or threatening behaviour, violence or abuse between those aged 16 or over who are or have been intimate partners or family members regardless of gender or sexuality." Types of domestic abuse

Domestic abuse can take many forms such as psychological, physical, sexual, economical and emotional.

Controlling behaviour is: a range of acts designed to make a person subordinate and/or dependent by isolating them from sources of support, exploiting their resources and capacities for personal gain, depriving them of the means needed for independence, resistance and escape and regulating their everyday behaviour. Coercive behaviour is: an act or a pattern of acts of assault, threats, humiliation and intimidation or other abuse that is used to harm, punish, or frighten their victim." They help to bridge the gap between isolated, excluded, vulnerable and lonely individuals and statutory and/or voluntary organisations which offer specific solutions to identified needs. 

At the start of lockdown, the Church of England's policy prevented the mowing of

C of E graveyards across the country. This has enabled the wild flowers to flourish amidst the long grass, encouraging pollinators such as butterflies and bees in our churchyards. Orchids appeared in Vobster, and in both churchyards there was birdsfoot trefoil,

having lifted the ban on mowing churchyards, has encouraged us to explore the Ecochurch programme and create a Living Churchyard – a great name for a place where 'biodiversity becomes the variety of life on Earth' as the C of E calls it. This is also one of the C of E's five marks of mission which is to care for God's creation. There is an ecumenical video called **Nature in his Name** which helps us to understand our part in creation. The link to it is on our website as outlined below.

To bring us up to date, now the wildflowers have gone to seed, everything is being cut back and, over the winter, the PCC will be planning our approach to this, consulting with experts in the field as well as the local community.

It is appreciated that there needs to be a balance of mowing around the church and the graves which will continue.

Many graves are beautifully tended by families and, as long as objects such as flowers are kept to the graves themselves, moving will continue to complement this. In addition, we will be moving pathways to allow folk to walk through and around the churchyard.

MELLS PARISH COUNCIL (mellsparishcouncil.org.uk)

Precis of the remote meetings held via Zoom in July and August *Unitary Authority*: Current government policy is to dissolve district councils and have unitary councils. Somerset CC would like a 'One Somerset' approach although it is probably more realistic to split the area into east/west to form two smaller unitary councils. Somerset is being used as a test case so it is likely that the formation of a unitary council will go ahead. Some form of consultation will be taking place between September and November with a decision being made in December.

Superfast broadband: Various options have been looked into and a few have now been discounted. CDS: (Connecting Devon and Somerset) – Due to the collapse of Carillion, they have had to re-tender. Completion date is by the end of 2023 but there is no guarantee this will include Mells or Vobster. Voneus.

Buckland Dinham is supplied by Voneus but there are no plans at present to come to Mells although they are "preparing a major plan for the area"... Truespeed: Not enough interest had been raised with the household sign ups. Their basic price for broadband is expensive at around £50/month (they have been asked for

more flexible pricing). Truespeed is currently supplying Leigh and part of Coleford but have so far failed to live up to promises to bring a service to Chantry.

Openreach: Could bring fibre to all of Mells but would make a charge of £140K to do so. Fibreway: Is a small Midsomer Norton based firm which supplies a hybrid service - ie wireless and/or fibre. They are currently preparing a plan based on a fixed wireless supply from Whatley over the Quarry to southern Mells.

It is hoped a proposal will be put forward very soon (weeks rather than months) which could be followed by rapid first stage implementation. They would consider Vobster once Mells is supplied.

Defibrillator: This has now been fixed to the shop wall and has been insured against theft and damage.

Condition of grass triangle – Bottom Lane: Matting and other options to protect the area are being looked into.

Litter by pond: The Clerk has made contact with the contractor to request more frequent emptying but no action has been taken yet. To be chased. Larger bin options will also been assessed.

Parking: Parking by the shop and on the bend at the start of the walk to the old iron works continues to be a problem this year. Bus drivers have reported their concerns to the police.

Date of next meeting: Tuesday September 22nd 2020 at 7.15pm in Mells Barn unless COVID-19 restrictions remain in place.

Alternatively the meeting will be held remotely via Zoom at 7.30pm. Information on how to join the meeting will be posted on the agenda on the parish council website.

DAVID RAWLINS CONTINUES HIS HISTORY OF CHANTRY – INCLUDING OTHER VILLAGES ON THE WAY

Domesday The most famous document from William the Conqueror's time is the Domesday Book completed in one year in 1086.

The Commissioners took evidence on oath, from the Sheriff, from all the Baron and French men and from the whole hundred (subdivision of the shire based on groups of estates adding up to 100 hides, a hide being the land necessary to sustain a peasant household) – the priests, the Reeves and six villagers from each village.

In 1066 William proposed that the English and French should be equally represented, by land holdings and influence at Court.

However by 1086 things had dramatically changed. William had fought foreign wars to safeguard his possessions in Normandy. For this he had to have money so he taxed the English very heavily. The old English Kings used to raise money by a land tax or Geld. William imposed Gelds in 1066, 1067 and 1083 and one other in the middle of his reign. The English resented the heavy taxation and rose in revolt. Many times William suppressed these revolts and gradually gave the land and manors to his supporters, Normans, Bretons and French. The last major revolt was in Yorkshire, and the land was wasted. Corn was burnt and buildings burnt down and peasants dispossessed. Many died.

<u>Elm</u> The name Telvve. It is almost certainly a mistake. It was known as The Elme, 'the' was shortened to a 'T' and the 'M' was replaced by two 'V's. Domesday was

very hurried (it was completed in a year and copied out as well), so someone with poor writing could make an 'M' look like two 'V's.

Domesday is full of abbreviations and is very difficult to render into modern English. Indeed in the final copy, the villages are scored through with a red line. as indeed are most manors.

In 1066 William the Conqueror said that Normans and Anglo Saxons would be equal, sharing the landholders and manors. However, by 1086 – Domesday – because of various revolts, including one or more in Somerset, the Normans had taken over most of the country.

Dunn, prior to the Conquest was a major landowner. He held 30 manors, mainly in Somerset, Gloucester and Devon. Up to 1066 Dunn held the Manor of Buckland Dinham and Elm.

In 1088 – Domesday

He held: Buckland Dinham

Bitton, Gloucester As Kings Thane

Devon Newton & Nutwell

Devon Spridlescomb from Court of Manor

Thus he was reduced to five manors from the king and one from Court of Manor. He could not sell them or dispose of them.

He held the manors from the king as the king's Thegn. Many landowners were reduced to servants of the King as Thegns. They were administrators: the English state was well organised and the Conqueror needed men with knowledge of the districts. Dunn was allowed to hold Buckland Dinham, but not Elm.

The Conqueror gave Elm to Osbern Giffard. He was given three Somerset manors. He was given about 19 other manors and houses (messuages) in various towns, most of which had belonged to Dunn. Brimpsfield in Gloucestershire became his seat.

Elm paid tax for five hides and had land for four ploughs. There were two slaves, three villagers and four small holders. These would have been working men – the children and women would have not been counted. He would probably have a resident agent. This would add up to ten men; therefore the total population would be 40-60 people. There were two mills in the village which would have been on the river. There were 14 acres of meadow, 14 acres of pasture and 16 acres of underwood. Also listed are one cob, 15 cattle, 16 pigs, 250 sheep and 50 goats. It was valued at £4.00. This would possibly have been the annual tax.

<u>Whatley</u>

It is not known when Glastonbury Abbey was given Whatley. Mells was given in 942AD, but neither Whatley nor Downhead were not mentioned in the Charter.

Wulfgar the Monk held them before 1086. The translations of Domesday state that he could not be separated from the church – the Latin is 'separari'. However, consulting my Latin dictionary I discovered that 'separo' could also mean 'act for themselves' (used by Caesar). This make a lot more sense. Downhead was passed form King Aethelwulf to Glastonbury in 854.

Glastonbury Abbey held Whatleigh. The subtenancy was held by Wulfgar the Monk. Glastonbury Abbey still held it in 1086, but the subtenant was Walter Hussey and John the Usher who held nine other manors, mainly in Somerset. Walter Hussey held four other manors and two parts of the Borough of Malmesbury. John the Usher held Egford, later a manor in its own right.

"Walter Hussey holds 4 hides in Whatley from the Abbot. Wulfgar, a monk, held them before1066; he could not be separated from the church. Land for 4 ploughs, of which 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ hides are in lordship; 2 ploughs there; 4 slaves;

8 villagers and 5 smallholders with 2 ploughs and 1 ¹/₂ hides.

A mill which pays 5s; meadow, 6 acres; pasture, 50 acres; woodland, 14 acres. 8 cattle; 100 sheep.

Value 70s; when he acquired it, 30s.

John the Usher holds 1 hide of villagers' land in this manor from the Abbot. Land for 1 plough, which is there, with 2 villagers.

Value 15s; when John acquired it, as much."

Only the working men were counted, women and children were not counted. If he had an agent, this is 20 men. The population would have been 80-120 people. Ernis Held Downhead from the Abbot. The entry mentions Asham Wood – woodland half a league long and as wide. – *to be continued*
