Maybe the flavour and texture just doesn't appeal or maybe memories of a childhood incident is the reason? They remind me of perhaps when I was four or five years old. My father, at that time, was for some reason not on good terms with my maternal grandmother. One day he was enjoying a gooseberry pudding with his evening meal and my mum, hoping perhaps to heal the breach, remarked that her mother had made the pudding for him. Suddenly my dad pushed the plate away with a sneer, saying that he didn't fancy any more. He was good at sneering was my dad. My mum picked up the pudding in its basin

No treatment possible as I had the maximum radiotherapy (25 days) for my endometrial cancer three years ago. Totally unexpected and so annoying. I've only just got over my 93rd birthday pneumonia and I can't afford to waste any more time being ill and letting people down. So I am just ignoring this beastly thing till it becomes a real nuisance which it isn't at the moment apart from sudden spells of extreme exhaustion. In between these I'm fine, sitting down jobs are especially good so I plan to go

on "jotting" as long as I can – unless everyone is fed up with my nonsense.

ANTHONY JAMES (AJ) CHARLTON

October 15th 1929 - June 30th 2025

On Friday August 8th 2025, St Michael's church was full of the family and friends of AJ Charlton who had gathered together for a memorial service to celebrate his life. The service was conducted by the Reverend Pauline Reid with Jenny Waller at the organ. The service began with a recording of Nana Mouskouri's *I have a dream* and ended with Jim Reeves' *I'll fly away*. Hymns were *Praise my soul the King of Heaven, Lord of all Hopefulness, and Abide with Me*.

Through the memories of his children and grandchildren, a picture emerged of AJ's remarkable life. Growing up in the war years, life was hard with no electricity or mains water. AJ was too young to fight, but he left school at 14, taking the shire horses to Mells for shoeing and making pit props. He would collect all the timber that could be made use of to fire the ovens for cakes and breads.


AJ settled in Hemington working 14-hour days, looking after his own herd of cattle before and after work. After the death of his father, AJ took over the Charlton sawmill and over the years grew and expanded the business, bringing in family members.


As a businessman, AJ was legendary as a hard negotiator, always looking for the best price. He also loved to socialise, serving on Buckland Dinham Parish Council for many years. AJ was a staunch loyalist and was delighted to meet Prince Charles when he received the Royal Warrant for gates for the royal estates.

In his final days AJ moved to a care home where he died peacefully with all his affairs on order, a businessman to the last.











AJ will be remembered as a charming man with a great sense of humour who always had a twinkle in his eye. He was a "character" and a gentleman, a strong and sociable man, and he will be much missed.

In her address, Pauline acknowledged the pain of losing someone we love. There are no easy answers about what death means, but we do have the promise of Jesus that there will be a place for all of us where there is no more suffering and pain. Meanwhile AJ's life and character live on in the memories of those who loved him.

Finally, we should mention AJ's beloved dog, Daisy who behaved impeccably throughout the service.

Donations were divided between Dorothy House and St Michael's church.

Our thoughts and prayers are with the Charlton family as they mourn the passing of a remarkable man.

BAPTISM OF JACOB ROSSITER

On Sunday August 3rd 2025, St Michael's church was alive with families and young children, who had gathered together to celebrate the baptism of five month-old Jacob Rossiter, son of Jenna and Andy and brother of Isaac.

The service was conducted by the Reverend Pauline Reid. It should be said that throughout the service Jacob kept smiling and alert, happily taking each new experience in his stride!

Hymns were *Morning has Broken, All Things Bright and Beautiful* and *Give me Joy in my Heart*. The service began with a reading of Jim Roswell's poem "Follow your dreams", and was followed by Pauline's address, which took Mark 3.13-17 as its text and looked at the symbolism of water, the cross and the candle in the context of the service.



Water is a symbol of life and also of cleansing. Pauline reflected that all children do things to make their parents cross, including in her case eating forbidden raspberries. But the water symbolises forgiveness – it washes us clean so that we can begin again.

The cross traced on Jacob's forehead is also symbolic in that it's made of oil blessed by the bishop. Oil is difficult to remove, symbolising that God's presence is there for life.

Finally, Jacob was given a baptismal candle lit from the Easter candle. This is a symbol of resurrection and of love, which he can keep for the rest of his life.

It was a real privilege to be part of this joyful service. We wish Jacob and his family all the best as they grow together.

MRS ROSEMARY WILLIAMS, 1937-2025

On Friday July 18th, 2025, a burial service took place in St Michael's Church to celebrate the life of Mrs Rosemary Williams.

The service was conducted by the Reverend Martin Weymont with Paul Eyre at the organ. Rosemary's coffin was draped in the flag of the Royal Navy and decorated with white carnations and lilies. Hymns were *Love Divine, all Loves Excelling, Eternal Father, Strong to Save, How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds* and *God be in my Head.*

Martin began the service by welcoming Rosemary's friends and family both from the village and further afield, including representatives from the Royal Navy Association. He observed that although this was a sad occasion it was also an opportunity to celebrate Rosemary's wonderful life, reflected through tributes from her family in Australia, a representative from the RNA, and friends Anthea Kemp and Sam Nash.





Highlights of Rosemary's story included her happy childhood with holidays in Wales where she went sailing, and her time as a WREN which resulted in her patriotic and passionate life-long support for the RNA. It was in the Navy that she met Ian who she married in 1959 and with whom she shared 40 happy years.

After Ian left the Navy, his work took him all round the country, with the couple finally settling in Buckland Dinham. Among their many interests, which included touring in their Morgan car, their support for St Martin's church stood out: Rosemary gave willingly of her time in fundraising, hosting prayer groups, and acting as secretary to the PCC and as church warden. Martin particularly remembered her Christmas lunches, where the wine flowed freely!

After Ian's death Rosemary's health deteriorated and she made the move to Frome, spending her last days in the Belmont Villa care home where she continued to practise her faith as a committed communicant. Rosemary always kept a positive attitude, secure in her faith that the kingdom of heaven awaited her.

Martin reminded us of the church's teaching about the resurrection of the dead which means we can see death not as a final state, but a step on the way to being reunited with those we love.

Rosemary was buried in the same grave as Ian.

Thanks to Sam Nash for all her work in organising this moving service.

SOMERSET COUNCIL - COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Emergency Planning Measures: Somerset Council has suspended normal planning services for at least 12 weeks. During this period, new and straightforward applications will be prioritised. Older or more complex cases will likely face further delays, and planning enforcement will be deprioritised.

£190 million Transformation Plan: Somerset Council has approved its delayed "Inspiring Innovation" Transformation Plan, which outlines how the authority aims to save £190 million over five years. A strategic transformation partner will be sought to help develop detailed business cases and support delivery.

Pay Review Costs: Somerset Council has confirmed that its pay and grading review could add up to £8 million to the annual payroll bill by 2026/27, in addition to £3 million already

allocated to deliver the review itself using an outsourced partner. At Full Council, councillors questioned the cost and timing of the review given the Council's current financial emergency.

New Waste Calendars and Food Recycling Push: Somerset residents are receiving updated recycling and rubbish collection calendars which sets out collection days for the next 18 months. 45% of food in household rubbish is still discarded in its packaging. The Council and contractor SUEZ will run a year-long campaign to encourage better food waste separation and promote the environmental and cost benefits of using food caddies. Residents can order free kitchen caddies and food waste bins online.

Transport Plan Consultation Opens: Somerset Council has launched a public consultation on its draft Local Transport Plan.
