The parrots would have happily crunched dog pellets but my poor Ebbie would not have appreciated parrot mixtures. Luckly sanity resurfaced in time to recover the error. I could blame it on old age but in earlier years when I did B&Bs I once added a box of dog biscuits to the packets of breakfast cereal choices so such errors are obviously the fault of a feeble mind under stress.

Wildlife also generally doesn't know whether it is coming or going. Up until the post-Christmas freeze the weather was so mild that everything just kept on growing. The climbing nasturtiums in my porch reached a height of about 15 feet, up and over the front door and were still flowering cheerfully at Christmas. And some mysterious insect had recently eaten holes in my geranium leaves, a thing I have never known before in December. Round holes, as a caterpillar would make, what but what kind of caterpillar would be active in December? And why choose tough geranium leaves when plenty of softer foliage

surrounded them? Any ideas anyone? Usually by December my geraniums are tucked away by the kitchen door walls and the shelter of the surrounding stable yard wall so that whatever mysterious predator has attacked them might not have found them before. This year the poor things have been caught in the front porch I haven't yet had anyone to help move the heavy pots so I hope they will survive. An odd thing I have noticed at the time of writing this in the second week of January is the absence – or invisibility - of my garden snowdrops. As I am sure I have mentioned in earlier years, ever since we arrived here 50 odd years ago on January 21st to find a carpet of snowdrops in flowers they have bloomed each year on that date. At the moment there is no sign of them of even when scraping aside the fallen autumn leaf cover. I thought perhaps they were just having a later flowering year but on wandering around the churchyard, I see there are hundreds -thousands? – of white bells scattered over graves and beneath trees. So, where are mine? My bluebells are already well up along the path and the ever increasing patch of hyacinths (from many gifted bowls, later planted out for succeeding years' flowering) are well about ground. For 50 odd years I have revelled in my

One thing is certain they will have to do it quickly, like speeded up cycles of growth cycles we see on TV wildlife films.

Something I cannot grow despite many money wasting attempts is winter aconites. I do love them cheerful buttercup faces sitting above their green choirboy frills. Such a brave prelude to early spring. Having achieved two a few years ago (out of 20 planted) I thought I had succeeded at last but I haven't seen them since. Any ideas as to why, or advice, would be very welcome. They were planted "in the green" (pre-flowering) and recommended.

Ivy is said to be wonderful thing to grow for wildlife. The bees love the blossom and the birds love the berries and also find shelter in the thick growth. Having a 9ft wall along my north boundary this is always ivy covered although every few years in summer I have it cleared so it doesn't actually grow in among the old stones to

And now I see, through the lattice of ivy the first of the promised snow is beginning to fall so I had better go and post this in case we get snowed in. See you in March, *Hazell*

OUR VERY OWN REPAIR SHOP SAVES THE NATIVITY

Every year at St Michael's we reach up to the top of the vestry cupboard to find the box labelled 'Christmas' and unwrap the nativity figures to put in the crib. They have traditionally been much used and much loved, as evidenced by flaking paint, missing hands and ears, and even a wobbly head repaired many times with sticky tape.

Last Christmas, however, all that changed. Vivienne Bolton, who attends St Michael's church regularly, spotted the rather worn and dilapidated state of the set and volunteered to carry out her very own Repair Shop rescue.

First of all, Vivienne did her research. Our set, she discovered, was probably between 80 and 100 years old, reasonably rare, and so worth restoring. By comparing it to photographs of similar sets, she discovered that one piece was missing, probably an angel. Because it was made of a soft plaster, it was hardly surprising that it had become damaged over the years. Also the dampness of the church meant the plaster would have absorbed water from the atmosphere over the years.

How did Vivienne go about the restoration?

First of all, she used air-drying clay to re-form missing ears and hands, and indeed a thumb. When the clay parts were dry, she then glued them back on using epoxy resin. Fine sandpaper ensured the joins were invisible. Vivienne then mixed acrylic paints to match the original colours, and oh-so-carefully painted the new parts, finishing with a satin varnish.





The restored nativity set is now stored in a secure plastic box which includes a capillary mat to catch any lingering damp. Each figure has its own wrapping to prevent damage from knocking against the others, and we have strict instructions NOT to lift the figures out by the head (or ears). Just as in the more famous Repair Shop, we were very moved both by the result of the restoration (it looks beautiful!) and the love, skill and care Vivienne brought to the task. It formed a very fitting centre piece for our carol service this year – especially when the children added a flock of knitted sheep to the scene.

Thank you, Vivienne. And I believe you may have another set to restore for Norton St Philip next year...

MRS GLENYS MELLOR, 1941-2024

At 1:00pm on Thursday December 12th 2024, a funeral service took place in St Michael's Church, Buckland Dinham to celebrate the life of Glenys Mellor. The church was full, as family and friends from the village gathered together to remember Glenys. A beautiful display of



lilies decorated the altar, a fitting tribute to Glenys who was an avid gardener.

The service was conducted by The Reverend Pauline Reid. Hymns were *Love Divine* and *Abide with me*, two beautiful choices. Scripture readings were Psalm 23, and John 6:35-40.. Pauline began her address by sharing with us how privileged she felt to hear about memories of Glenys from her family, and to build up a picture of her life. She led a varied and active life - as a farmer's wife moving around the country in the early years of her marriage, as a mother of two daughters, and as a youth support worker in Frome in her later years. In retirement, Glenys set an example to us all by making the most of her time, travelling the world with her husband Ben and their close friends.

At home, Glenys was always busy and a passionate gardener, to the extent that her garden was referred to as "paradise' by her friends. She also took part in many village activities including Open Gardens and the much-remembered Christmas Tree Festival which filled the church with trees sponsored by local enterprises.

Pauline observed that someone so close to the natural world as Glenys would be familiar with the cycle of life. She suggested that one way to think of her passing is to imagine her going home. Although losing a loved one is never easy, there is comfort in knowing that Glenys is safe in God's hands. Glenys was buried in St Michael's churchyard beside her husband Ben. Following the burial, the funeral party gathered in the village hall. Glenys leaves behind two daughters as well as two grandchildren and three greatgrandchildren. Our thoughts and prayers are with her family and friends at this time.

The Call for Sites is a six-week period where landowners, developers, and site promoters are invited to submit land they want to be considered for future development. Submissions can be for various uses including housing, economic development, gypsy and traveller pitches and plots, and renewable energy installations.

SLINKY transport service: This demand responsive transport is a bookable, flexible service which residents can use if there is no public transport alternative. All users need to do is register online to start using the Slinky bus to get to the shops, to visit friends and family, get to college or social clubs, or access medical appointments. You can also call: **01749 880482** for Mendip area. The



service is available to anyone in Somerset who does not have access to a regular bus service. Car owners can also use Slinky.

The Boundary Commission has launched a consultation on new division boundaries in Somerset - lgbce.org.uk/all-reviews/somerset. Mells is not affected by the proposals.

MATTERS ARISING

Quarry noise: Cllr West reported that there had been four noise complaints at night and three in the evening over the past few months. An electric vehicle has been ordered which should further decrease noise.

Trees in Vobster graveyard: These have been looked at by the PCC and arrangements will be made to remove them as they are likely to cause damage to the wall if left in situ long term.

Bus shelter graffiti – Vobster: Cllrs Brady and West will carry out the work.





HIGHWAY AND FOOTPATH ISSUES:

Condition of grass triangle – Bottom Lane: Cllr Henderson will confirm with the resident that they may go ahead with the planting of a memorial crab apple tree.

Area in front of Vobster Inn: Cllr Seviour will obtain quotes for the planting barrels. There is currently an abandoned vehicle on the land which has been reported to Somerset Council.

Speeding vehicles in Vobster: No response has been received from Highways. Clerk to approach again to ask if it is feasible to reduce the speed limit and what the process is.

Park Corner: Cllr Seewooruttun reported that the details of another two vehicle accident had been passed to Highways. Clerk to ask Highways to accelerate their intentions for this junction.

Damaged bridge – Vobster Cross: Clerk to approach Nick Jacklin, Head of the bridge department as no progress has been made to date.

PLANNING - New applications:

2024/2251/HSE: Erection of single storey front porch and single storey rear extension – Stone Cottage, Upper Vobster Road. No objections.

2024/2291/TCA: Beech x 6 – raise canopy by three metres – Mells Green to Little Green, Mells Estate (notification only, being dealt with by Tree Officer)

2024/2055/HSE: Erection of single storey extension and associated works (retrospective) – 6 St Edmunds Terrace, Upper Vobster Road. No objections

FINANCIAL MATTERS

Budget and precept setting: After discussion, it was agreed by all present, that the precept should increase by £1,500 to cover the additional costs of emptying the bins and general village upkeep etc. The precept therefore for 2025/2026 was set at £16,500.

Items to report, items for next agenda

Funding for church: Cllr Asquith asked if other churches in the area received funding from the parish council as the situation was getting quite critical for the church. This would need a substantial increase in the precept to cover the costs and would require the support of the parish.

Lime Kiln Hill – debris: Cllr Brady will contact Penny's to request that the road is kept clear of mud and gravel.

Verge – Top Lane: The verge is being eroded by the works being carried out at Bridge Cottage. Clerk to ask the owner to reinstate once works are completed.

Now we look forward to 2025, wishing all our neighbours the happiest of years, with much community good will and companionship.


The collection from last month's Group Service, including Gift Aid, amounted to £56.25 and was given to Fair Frome.
